SIXTY YEARS DEFENDING HUMAN RIGHTS

“In October 1960 a young barrister got on the London Underground, opened his paper and read a short article about a couple of students in Portugal who had been imprisoned for seven years after raising their glasses to freedom.

Sounds uneventful, but this was to become one of the most significant moments in the global movement for human rights. That barrister was called Peter Benenson, and his outrage at the imprisonment of two men led to the birth of Amnesty International.” (taken from the amnesty.org.uk web site).

Southampton Amnesty Group was formed in 1964 and is one of the longest standing groups in the UK Section of Amnesty International. We have worked on a variety of tasks organised around three main themes:

Campaign for the respect of human rights- This is done by writing letters to UK and non UK government officials, to prisoners and human rights defenders.

Raise awareness of human rights in the local community- we do this by organising social events, public lectures, concerts etc.

Raise funds for Amnesty International- via fee paying social events, tin rattles etc.

AI's VISION

is of a world in which every person enjoys all of the human rights enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and other international standards

AI's MISSION

is to undertake research and action focused on preventing and ending grave abuses of the rights to physical and mental integrity, freedom and conscience and expression and freedom from discrimination, within the context of its work to promote all human rights

AI's CORE VALUES

remain those of international solidarity, effective action for the individual victim, global coverage, the universality and indivisibility of human rights, impartiality and independence, and democracy and mutual respect

TURKEY

METU PRIDE DEFENDERS Prosecuted for celebrating LGBTI rights

Biology students Melike Balkan and Özgür Gür are among 19 people facing trial over a peaceful protest at the Middle East Technical University (METU) in Ankara.

Melike and Özgür defend lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI+) rights. As prominent members of the LGBTI+ Solidarity Group at METU, they have organised numerous marches, meetings and other events amid an upsurge in homophobia and increasing restrictions on freedom of expression in Turkey.

METU LGBTI+ Solidarity Group has organised an annual Pride march on campus since 2011. In 2019, the university managers told students the Pride march planned for 10th May could not go ahead. Undeterred, the Solidarity Group staged a Pride sit-in. The university called the police, who used excessive force, including tear gas, against the peaceful protesters. They arrested at least 23 students-including Melike and Özgür. Eighteen students and one academic face trial.

APPEAL

Ask the Minister of Justice to ensure the acquittal of 19 people unfairly prosecuted for alleged participation in Pride Parade at METU 2019

In your letter ask him:

- Ensure the acquittal of the 18 METU students and the academic for alleged participation in the Pride Parade on 10th May 2019
- Ensure a prompt, independent and impartial investigation into police conduct on METU campus on 10th May 2019, and bring to justice any police officers who acted unlawfully.
